



Sanitary measures COVID 19

Préfleuri strictly follows the recommendations of the OFSP which forms the basis of our references for the implementation of our sanitary measures.

To accommodate your children in optimal conditions, the hygiene measures put in place are as follows:



Before the arrival of each child, a medical certificate dated less than a week attesting that the enrolled student is in good health will be required.



Inside the school, play areas, vehicles, and sports equipment are disinfected daily.



The temperature of staff and children is measured every morning. Parents of day students are asked to monitor their children's temperature every morning and record their temperature in the daily agenda.



Meals:

The entire team wears a mask during the student's meals. Adults do not have lunch with children..



Préfleuri works closely with the doctors of Villars (Doctor Loiret-Bernal and Doctor Baraschi) to ensure a medical follow-up and the well-being of each member of our school.



Disinfectant dispensers are available at each entrance to the school, in each class, in the vehicles and available during each excursion. Each member of the team strictly adheres to the health instructions and ensures their application.



The number of students per room has been reduced.



Symptoms for day students:

Every family is asked not to send their child to school if they are ill.

Any student with COVID symptoms will not be accepted at school. A medical certificate stating that the child can return to school will be required. The boarding school team will apply the same rule for their boarders.



No visit allowed inside the school for prospective families, however, we are able to welcome families and show them around the outside of our campus. Wearing a mask is requested for each adult visiting us.



The wearing of a mask is required for all our bus drivers, and for our team when the distances cannot be respected.

This document will be updated regularly according to changes in the health situation and the directives of the OFSP (Federal Office of Public Health).
